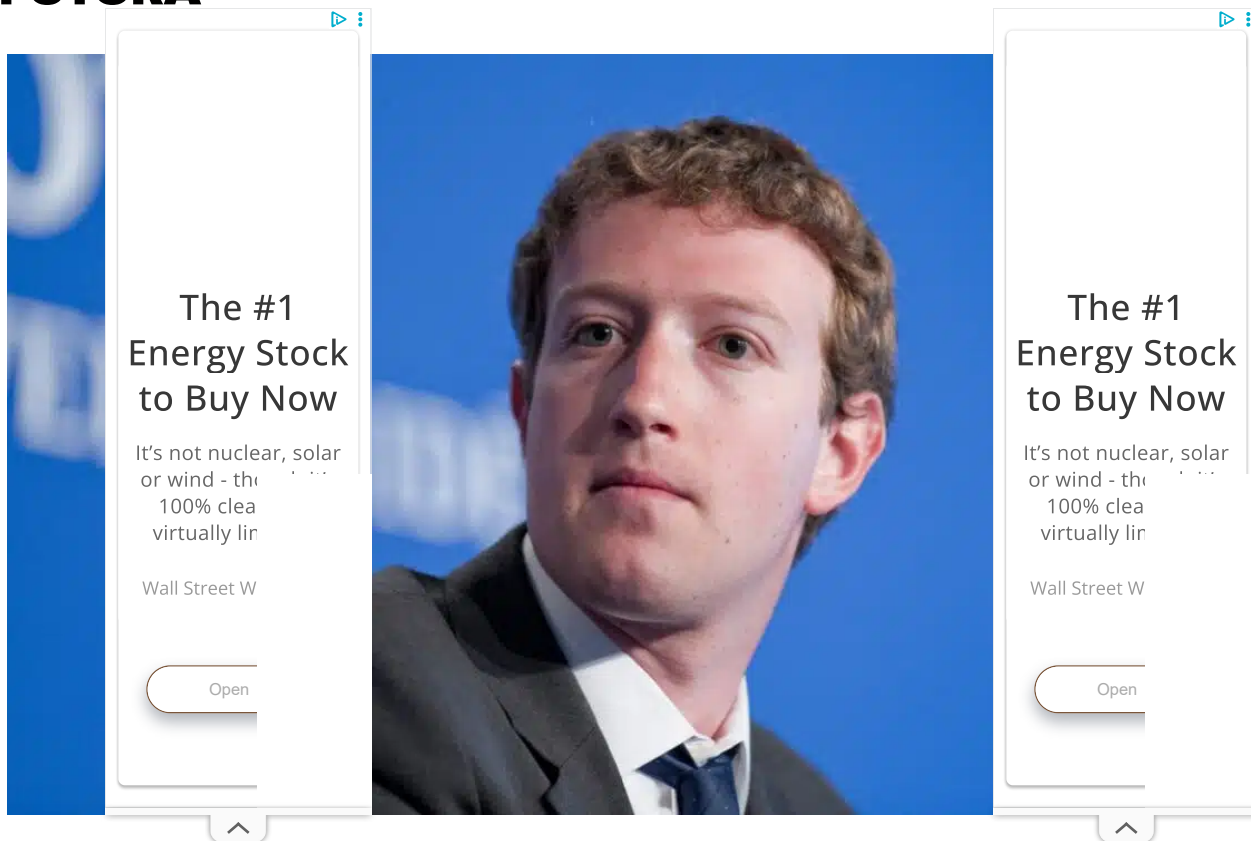


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Zuckerberg, Musk, and Altman declare the smartphone era over but Tim Cook isn't on board

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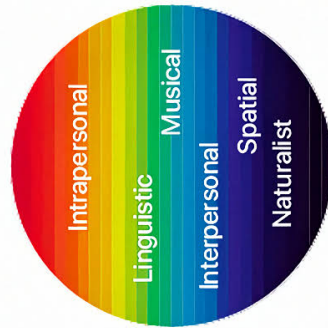

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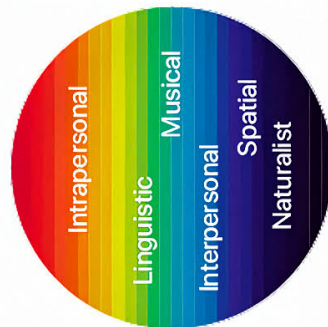

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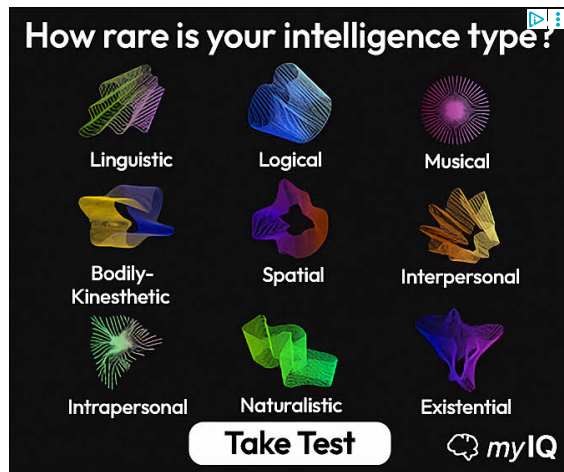
The age of seeing instead of touching

Whatever side wins, one truth is clear: the race to redefine the smartphone is reshaping how we think, work, and connect — and the next revolution may no longer fit in your pocket.



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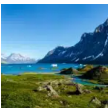
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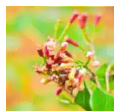


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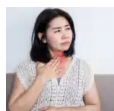
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
